Employee of the Month Kim McWhorter



Kim McWhorter, Program Coordinator, Riverside County/City Animal Shelter

Kim McWhorter is one of our most dedicated employees at the Western Riverside County/City Animal Shelter. As a Program Coordinator, Kim works diligently alongside all of our valued staff members, to provide care for and protect all of the animals at the shelter. For the past five years, Kim has been searching for grants to help the shelter. These grants have funded projects involving spay & neuter, adoption events, and other special shelter needs. One of Kim's greatest examples of this involves a grant from The American Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), in which she was instrumental in securing \$10,000 that was used to sponsor the Mega-Match-a-thon which was held on March 31st of this year. During this event over 400 animals were adopted (their lives were saved!) from the Riverside, CVAC & Blythe shelter's in a single day!

Before joining the shelter, Kim worked for the Riverside Disaster Preparedness Program, volunteered at the LA Zoo, and other various local nature centers. Behind the scenes, Kim is involved in Animal Venom Research International (AVRI). AVRI is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to "aid in the development of more effective prevention and treatment protocols for animal envenomation." Sri Lanka is a country currently battling thousands of venomous snake bites due to the high volume

of snakes present in their tropical environment. AVRI has started working on location in Sri Lanka to develop an anti-venom for snake-bite victims. The organization recently had a serpentarium (snake holding facility) built in Sri Lanka to collect venomous snake samples and their venom for research. Recently, the serpentarium has produced dry venom samples for research on some of the most desperately needed anti-venoms, such as the Russel-nosed viper.

Generally people are most interested in dogs or cats than other animals, but in Kim's case, her favorite pet is her Jungle Carpet Python, Smiley. Smiley has a very mellow temperament and often attends special functions with Kim. You can expect to see both Kim and Smiley at the Kids Critter Camp this summer. Beside Smiley, her two dogs Shadow and Bane are also a big part of her family.

To further her education, Kim is attending Loma Linda University to receive her doctorate degree in public health. When she finds spare time in her busy schedule, she enjoys hiking, painting, and travelling.

To our volunteers Kim would like to say, "You are absolutely indispensible and fantastic."

2012 Reminders

Constituents coming to apply at the shelter to be a Volunteer must fill out the on-line application on our Website - RCDAS.ORG. Please do not hand out Volunteer Registration forms at the Kiosk. We do understand that not all constituents have computers, so in that case, please contact Gile for the form.

The following Reminders are always worth a second read!

All teen volunteers need to sign in under the Pet Life Saverz Youth Club, then select the area you will be working in, such as adoptions, clinic, dog walking, kiosk, etc. All teen volunteer hours must be tracked for reporting purposes.

Important: When you notice there might be something wrong with one of the animals, write the kennel number and problem down on the White Board in Receiving. If you are not able to get to Receiving to do this, it is your responsibility to alert a staff member or supervisor and report the particular animal to them.

If you need to talk with one of the staff members, or another volunteer, and you see they are having a discussion with another person, *please do not interrupt them*. We all need to be respectful of this type of situation. Just come back later, or if it is very important, please contact another staff member.
